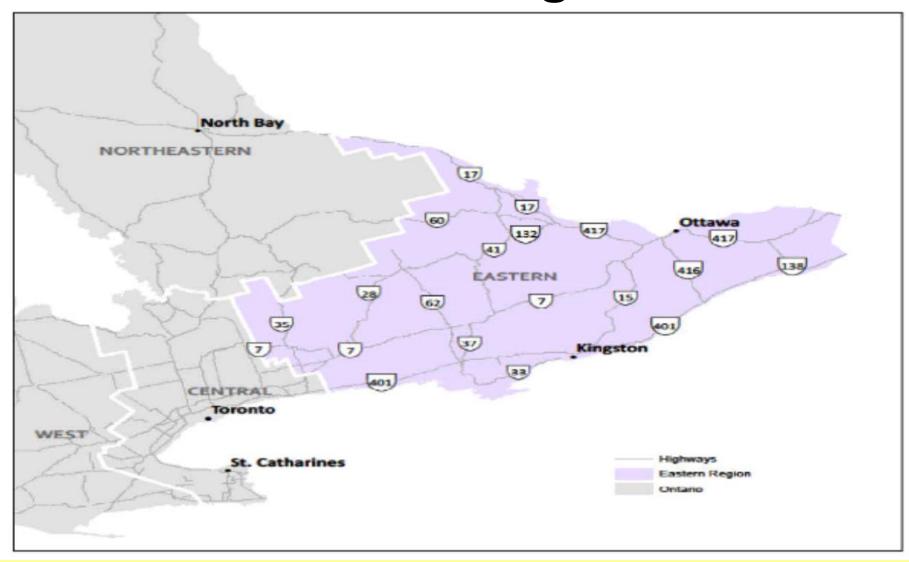

- Highway 401, Burnham St. to East of Nagle Rd. 4 to 6 Lane Widening (Complete)

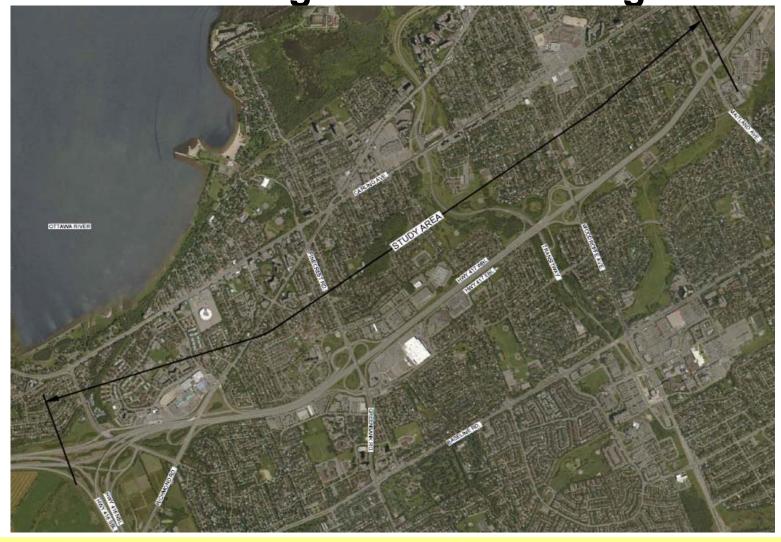


### **Future Expansion Projects-Ottawa Area**

- Highway 417 Bronson Avenue Interchange Improvements (Planned)
- Highway 417 Island Park Dr. to Metcalfe St. Noise Barriers (Planned)
- Highway 417, Hwy 416 to Maitland Avenue, 6 to 8 Lane widening (Planned)

### Scope of Work - Expansion

- This project is being bundled with the City's Stage 2 OLRT extension project.
- Widening of Highway 417 to 4 lanes in each direction between Highway 416 and Maitland Avenue
- Replacement of Richmond Road, Pinecrest Road, Woodroffe Avenue and Maitland Avenue Underpasses
- Replacing sections of existing noise barriers within the project limits
- Construction of related works including retaining walls, replacement and upgrades to drainage, roadside protection, illumination, highway signage, Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS) and landscaping
- Relocating utilities impacted by the highway widening

(Highway 417 ~ 5 Bridges, from Walkley Rd to Ramsayville Rd and Nicholas St. Bridge)

~ 300-350 Lane km per year

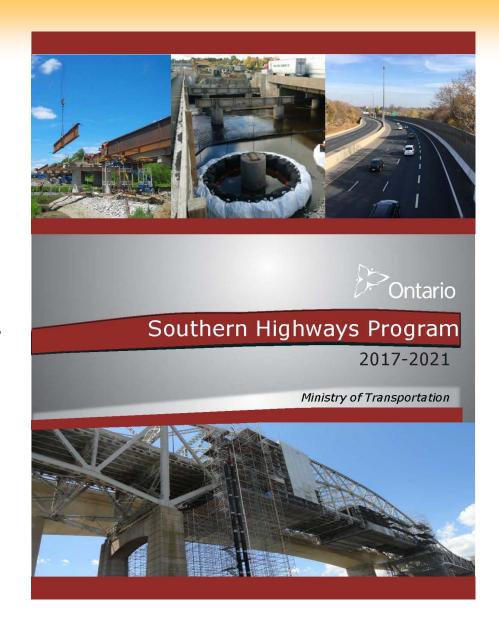

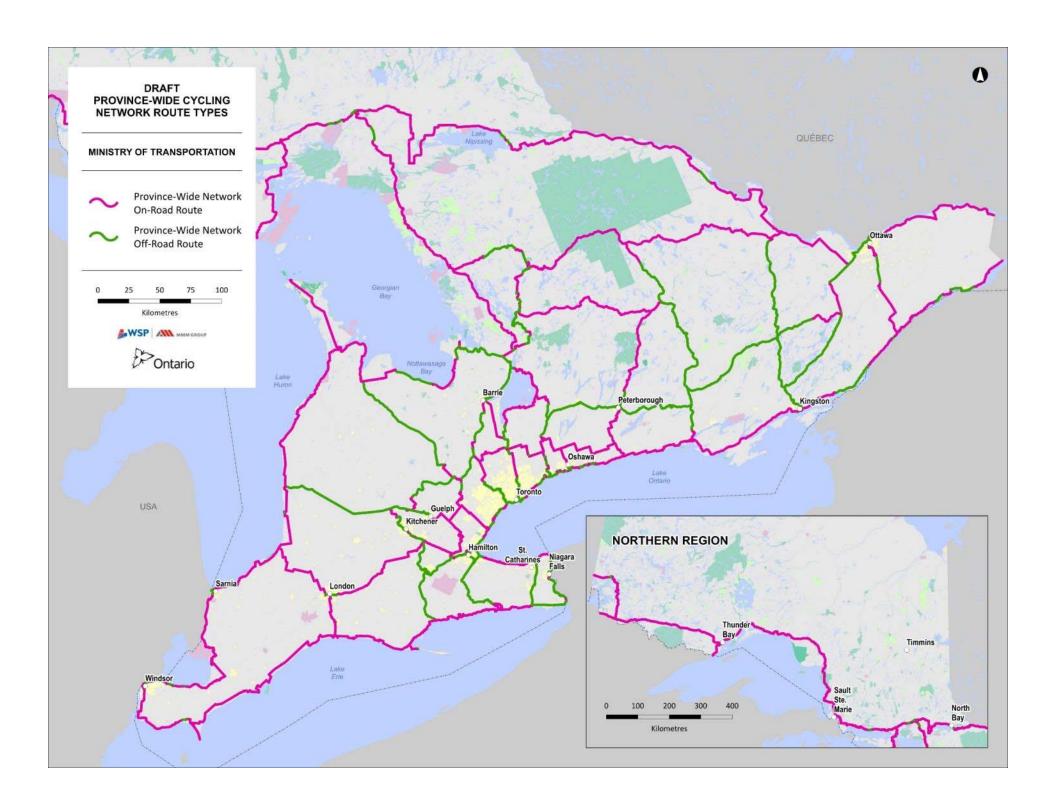


### **Draft Province-wide Cycling Network**

#### **Draft Network Summary**

- Over 8,000km of routes identified, based on the online engagement and workshops
- About 70% under municipal jurisdiction and about 30% under provincial jurisdiction
- Approximately half on existing cycling infrastructure
- 45% on existing major trails and cycling routes in the province
- The draft province-wide cycling network was posted on the Environmental Registry for public comment from April 12 to May 26, 2017.







### **Coming Up Soon**

- Early 2018
  - Proposal for Action Plan 2.0 to be posted on the Environmental Registry for public comment.
  - Final report on identification of the province-wide cycling network to be released.
  - Work to begin on implementation plan for network.
  - #CycleON Action Plan 2.0 to be published.

 Planning is underway to pave shoulders on provincewide cycling routes in Eastern Region within 5 year program.

### CMGC Highway 417 CPR O-Train EB & WB Bridges

#### **Currently in Detail Design:**

- First proposed use of Jack and Slide technology in Eastern Region
- Bridges will be reduced from 5 spans to a single span
- Demolition of the building on Young St under current bridge
- Will require full closure of Highway 417



### **CMGC Highway 417 Preston Street to Percy Street**

#### Currently in Detail Design:

- Rapid Replacement of ten bridges/overpasses on Highway 417 at Preston Street, Rochester Street, Booth Street, Bronson Avenue and Percy Street utilizing heavy lift rapid bridge replacement technology.
- Operational improvements including: the re-alignment of the Bronson Avenue W-N/S ramp and Chamberlain Avenue, replacement of median concrete barrier with tall wall, new LED illumination, and replacement of the highway drainage system (storm sewers) from the CPR O-Train overpass to the Kent Street overpass.
- Replacement of existing noise barriers on Highway 417 (Ottawa Queensway) at various locations as well as installation of new noise barriers (retrofit) at various locations.



#### The Road Ahead

- Continued focus on Pavements and Bridges
- Continued use of accelerated bridge construction
- Continued use of alternate delivery models
